Alliance of New York State YMCAs Stronger Together New York Secretary of State Recognizes YMCA's "A Better Place" as a Multi-Media Movement

When the Alliance of New York State YMCAs met in Albany on Wednesday, October 16, 80 YMCA representatives celebrated their collective efforts to strengthen the YMCA's mission to build healthy communities in mind, body, and spirit.

"A Better Place," a project born in the YMCA of the Greater Tri-Valley (Rome and Oneida) and features YMCAs from across the state, was recognized with an honorable citation from Governor Kathy Hochul.

While presenting the Executive Chamber citation to YMCA of the Greater Tri-Valley CEO Hank Leo, Secretary of State Walter T. Mosley said, "The mission of the Y reminds me of our mission at the Department of State: to bring people together, foster community, and create opportunities where there might not be opportunities."

"This universal message is highlighted in the "A Better Place" multi-media movement and is reflective of our motto at the Department of State, '*Opportunity Starts Here*,'" Mosley continued.

The "A Better Place" project brings artists, partners, and Ys from around the world to collaborate on a global multi-media effort, featuring three new, original songs and music videos, a series of educational children's books, an adaptive curriculum and a full-length movie, all by the same name. The project brings universal hope, unity, and faith during times when it is most needed. The first song, with original lyrics that take listeners through an emotional journey highlighting the sadness of

times during the Covid-19 pandemic and the soaring highs of using hope, faith and finally coming together to overcome differences, is only the beginning of what is unfolding into a major global multi-media project, with two additional songs, three children's books, music videos, a curriculum, and even a documentary. Fittingly, the YMCA has added representatives from the United Nations to the fold.

The first song was co-written by Matthew Beadle, a music teacher at the YMCA of the Greater Tri-Valley in 2020, and shepherded by Leo, to help raise funds for the Y as it lost a considerable amount of funding due to the pandemic, but also to help a struggling music program in Uganda. Through Leo's contacts, cold calls, and partnerships with other national and international YMCAs, the creators gathered regional, national, and international musicians, recording

Through the international language of music, the song aims to help heal racial divides, challenge pre-conceived opinions, and question cultural judgments. The education-based project, which includes a children's book series and curriculum, now features over 40 YMCAs, partners, and collaborators.

Beadle, regional and California-based lead vocalist "ZZ" Zainep Abdelaal, and curriculum developer Dan Eddy of Mohawk Valley Community College in Utica, NY also attended the Alliance meeting.

Rob Totaro, Director of Member Advancement of the Alliance of New York State YMCAs, Inc. has been instrumental in building the "A Better Place" website, <u>www.abetterplaceproject.org</u> with links to all project collaborators.

"The Alliance of New York State YMCAs was honored to spotlight the 'A Better Place' project and its enduring message of healing, connection, and hope at the Stronger Together Annual Meeting. We were deeply grateful to Secretary of State Walter T. Mosley for attending to present the YMCA with a Citation from Governor Hochul to recognize the project. Secretary Mosley has had a long history of public service throughout his career and as a strong supporter of the YMCA and its mission to serving and strengthening communities. We were honored to have him present the citation on the Governor's behalf and look forward to future collaborations with the Department of State, both with this project and in the future," said Kyle Stewart, Executive Director, Alliance of New York State YMCAs.
